Dear Parents of Year 4, 2016

We thank you for your support of the iPad Program at Kingsley Park Primary School. We are of the opinion that this program will help further the fruition of our Mission statement:

It is the mission of Kingsley Park Primary School to be a happy, safe and inspiring learning environment where children develop skills and qualities necessary to succeed in an ever-changing world.

This letter explains the implementation procedure and also includes a Commitment Form for you and your child to read and sign before commencing the iPad Program. In order for your child to participate in the iPad Program you will need to complete the form attached to this letter.

As part of the iPad Program the students will need certain educational Apps. As previously mentioned, families will be responsible for managing their own devices and ensuring that the Apps requested are on the iPad. To do this you will need an iTunes account. It is noteworthy to mention that any iPad released after September 2013, come with iLife and iWork installed. iLife and iWork are a suite of free Apps including: iPhoto, iMovie, Garage Band, Pages, Keynote and Numbers. As the iPads are transported to and from school it is imperative that you obtain a case that protects it sufficiently. It is strongly recommended that the cover you obtain protect the front and back edges of the iPad with a secure flap that covers over the screen when closed. At school children are required to cover the screen when they move around the school. iPads must be transported to and from school in the students' bags. They should not play with their iPads on the way home in a public space.

At Kingsley Park Primary School we want the iPad to be a device that brings harmony rather than discord to the household. In line with this we have provided on your Commitment Form an area where you, parent and child, can agree to three rules that will govern the use of iPads at home. Some examples of this are:

- *No iPads in bedrooms. They are to be utilised in common areas of the house*
- *Spend some time with your little brother and sister on the iPad*
- *Use the iPad for Homework*
- *Show parents your learning*

We are very excited by the opportunities that we will encounter with the iPads in enhancing engagement and collaborative learning. We wish to reassure you all that we know that our role as a teacher is a position of great responsibility. It is one that we take seriously and we will continue to utilise the best pedagogy we can to enable continuing success for your child.

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN WIFI AND 3G/4G?

3G and Wi-Fi are communication technologies that provide wireless Internet access and services to users. 3G and wireless are commonly used by devices such as laptop computers, smartphones and PDAs, and other entertainment gadgets.

The major difference between Wi-Fi and 3G is the way they connect to the Internet.

Wi-Fi connects to the Internet through a wireless network and has a short range. You may have a private wireless network set up at home; its range depends on your vicinity to your computer router. Wi-Fi is also commonly available in public places such as cafes, airports and shopping centres.

3G is a type of cellular network and connects to the Internet where ever there is mobile phone service. This means its range is a lot wider than a wireless network. Accessing the Internet through your mobile phone provider usually comes at a greater cost than Wi-Fi, especially if you are travelling overseas and using International Roaming.

When using a portable device that is capable of using both Wi-Fi and 3G, such as an iPhone, unless you have turned Wi-Fi off your device should always connect to the Internet using Wi-Fi unless it is not available. If it is not available or you are out of range, your device will then connect using 3G.
